RESULT OF NUMEROUS SLEEPLESS NIGHTS!

Muhammad Abbas Tibrary needs to be transformed Linto an active social space. A library is not just a space to access physical and digital data, but it also ought to create an environment to initiate interaction of people and exchange ideas between the people of diverse backgrounds and age groups visiting the library. It's difficult to design a library with its contextual environment to be fit in.



Public Library

I preferred angular lines to create interest of people to explore all aspects of the library building. It is basically a complex building which includes general library, children's library, exhibition hall and café. It's hard to design all spaces with their relevant relationship. I used hexagonal shapes at the front façade of the library section that refer to honey bee life circle. Honey bees' nest includes hexagonal cells, which houses a new born bee, and once it grows old enough, is replaced by another bee. I have related this phenomenon to new books replacing older ones, but the book racks still remain like cells. The surrounding environment is also designed intelligently with respect to their





All the activities merge together, and hence people enjoy various activities whether they take part in them or not. The salon and hall have been placed adjacent to the running track. This is an example of the integration of spaces, which encourage people to try new things by making these various activities viewable. The running track also passes by an ablution space. This was intended to make the prtaying area more accessible and promote spiritual thoughts and ideas to people as well. My objective was to create a community center that wasn't just to provide people with various sports, but to give a new perspective and meaning to these spaces and the building itself.





Working on this project has been a very interesting experience for me. This project was not just a shopping mall but a blend of mixed use complex that included retail shops, entertainment spaces and residential part. The complex was mainly divided into two sections i.e. shopping and residential facilities. The shopping section includes three hundred plus retail shops, restaurant, admin offices, children play area and two cinema screens in the mall building. I worked towards transforming the shopping mall into a social hub. During the design process, I preferred to enhance the interior of the space keeping in mind the psychology of daily users. I designed many open terraces for outdoor seating with the use of natural greens that made it more comfortable space for interaction. In the residential section, there were ten 3-bed apartments, ten 2-bed apartments and thirty single bed apartments with their basic services and needs. Each floor had its own unique balcony which allowed users to freely use it without worrying for the concern of privacy. The most challenging part of the design was to

Where modern architecture works towards aesthetics modesity, "form follows function" is based more on the function. Considering the basic principles of this idea, my cinema site has drastic angles in which the building form was adjusted by site constrains and the design prioritize in dealing with functions. I worked with geometrical shapes which seem quite prominent in the building's exterior view. I have given each space a different height to make sure that optimum functions and aesthetic form are both catered, I sufficiently lodged cinema and retails equally on every floor so that

people have easy access to almost

everything.



Darkness cannot drive out darkness: only light can. "

We know that hospitals are always dark ... dark with the emotions, anxiety, fear and what not. My design was focused to bring ease to people so that it helps in healing; fever or rash, fractures or sprains and longing for something unable to explain.

The main part of my design was to incorporate light lobbies in the building. The DNA shaped steel structure with glass was providing light at every inch of hospital. I designed centralized green patios around all the rooms of hospital to decrease the noscomephobia. The ground floor structure has 4 wings incorporating emergency, diagnostics, gynae, C.S.S.D and centralized circular pharmacy. The upper floor wings are rotated with cantilevers having I.P.D, O.T, surgical ward. Cantilevers of 1st floor were to be used as a shaded sitting space for visitors outside the building. The floor plans are rotating at different levels to let maximum light enter the ground floor. The whole structure has 4 layers in total. 1st layer is of main building ,2 nd is of I.P.D and 3rd is of patios. Last layer has steel DNA structure. I considered the planning of hospital according to ease of patients and doctors.







ospitals are one of the society's most enduring institutions; they tend to remain in place, evolving and regenerating themselves to care for us over many generations, sometimes even centuries. while Thospitals delivhr services of the present, they operate, inherited architecture of the past. I wanted to work on this project by introducing the humanizing-a-space concept that hasn't being worked on in the past.

Being nosocomephobic myself, I know how the hospital-phobia makes you feel like you are getting a heart transplant on even just a regular checkup!. So, the first step in designing the hospital was to work with easing the anxiety lead by this phobia. I created patios and designed the hospital building in a shape to ensure light and outdoor view at every possible area of the hospital. Noscomephobiacs want to have running-out-of-the-hospital opportunity at any given moment and that is why I focused on giving many entrances into the hospital all planned for specific flows of the users. Another humanizing factor I laid stress on was the use of therapeutic gardens with proper effective landscaping and the use of flower species that speed up the recovery in medical centers. As architects, we usually ignore the building material while designing, but in this project, I made sure the material I choose helps in building up a healing environment, so I incorporated a "Smog-Eating Facade". It consists of thermoformed shells coated in photocatalytic titanium dioxide. This coating reacts with light to neutralize elements of air pollution, negating the effects of up to 1,000 cars a day according to its developers.



"Simplicity is the ultimate Sophistication"

Then we talk about 'Less is More' today, most of us perceive it as exhausting and dull however it has further setting in it. I picked Minimalism as the base of my planning to refute this observation. Moderation is not simply thinking about the physical characteristics of the structure but is about the profound measurement and the invisible. To demonstrate that we can in any case make a space appealing and useful with less hues and embellishing highlights. Our site was at Kalar kahar with a great deal of difficulties, wherein the primary was contours. Therefore, I divided my site into various parts with different forms in order to cater precarious incline at any place, to achieve this, I incorporated a few steps of 3' to 4' wide. The main building that should be the architecture and performing arts department is placed equally on two contours that has a level difference of 8'. The structure is one unit, yet it is separated by expansion joints that are used as a safety measure for seismic tremor so that the entire structure would not collapse during an earthquake. The most appealing thing in it is the ventured shape in even (cantilevered) and vertical (contours) floors. I would not claim that I have developed something new, rather it is a derivation of the existing methods. The main reason behind the individuality of this project is the models and organizations of moderate engineering. I took various parts from numerous mediums and composed them as per my design idea and I must say it turned out great!





- 1) Centralized concept which refers to the process in which activities involving planning within an organization. The cafeteria is the basic need of all students in the university that's why it is designed in the center of the site so that everyone can have the minimum walking distance towards it.
- 2) Concept of Environment control with the help of nature complementing the history of the education system. If we look back at our early history with reference to the education system, people were used to study under the trees, where their classes were held. Keeping that in mind along with environmental control system, I used landscaping elements within the building, like Green Terraces and Green Air Atrium that can be incorporated with HVAC vents so that air flow is circulated via the plants as a filter. In the hot climate of Kallar Kahar, green terraces and green air atriums are used to reduce the temperature of the campus. The building's design of academic blocks is inspired by the neighborhood context, similar to the building of Kallar Kahar Cadet College.





"Architecture should speak of its time and place but yearn for timelessness."

Te were assigned with the project of a university campus on a contoured site at Kalar Kahar. The basic focus of this project was to familiarize the students with the challenges faced while working with a sloping site. We had to design the campus in a way that it fulfills all its requirements, was user-friendly as well as had the minimum use of cut and fill and optimum use of the natural levels of the contoured site.

I took fluid architecture as inspiration while I was designing the campus. Fluidity and sense go hand in hand for the architecture of tomorrow. Fluidity in architecture helps the traditional architecture get more creative and futuristic and that is what I wanted to go for, for this project.

I divided the user flow of the campus into three different patterns i.e. flow of visitors, students, and faculty, the flow of staff and flow of residencies and hostels, etc. I used the existing natural contours as a design element while developing the master plan. Since we were asked to design the School of Architecture and Planning in extensively, I worked with the standard measurements and areas from TSS and PCATP black book. I designed the building block to specifically fall on the natural contours and used the natural levels to create an aesthetic as well as a unique design element in the building. Keeping in mind the scarcity of water in coming times. I also incorporated the concept of rainwater harvesting through different water diversions alongside the roads and pathways and provided a water reservoir on the deepest level of my site.

The project was to analyze and bring back an urban space to life by regenerating it. The area given was Dayal Singh Mansion. We had to specify the problems related to the area and then propose a master plan addressing those issues. The community involvement in the design process was the key point in this project. The challenge in the project was to design a mutual space for a community which was divided into two zones one was living life above poverty line and the other were living life below poverty line. Their difference of opinion for each other was one of the major issues. So, the principal concept behind the organization and the linkage between spaces was to promote interaction between the community zones and the outer urban existence, as well as preserving the working spaces of the residents. The area was divided into four parts. The left entrance was catering the circulation for the workshops. The main entrance served parking then a triangular space which had all the traditional and famous eateries of that area and spaces holding urban furniture for the interaction between the community and the people coming from different areas of the city. The right side incorporated the preserved houses, a masjid, a grave yard and social interaction hub which basically was designed for the people to come and share their inventions: basically provides a platform for people to speak. The rear side of the area was designed as a residential space for the community. The whole area was pedestrianized (except workshop area) with provision of bicycle movement. The ratio between green footprint and carbon footprint was also the corner stone of the project.



Birds standout amongst the most delightful creatures of the world. Hunza's atmospheric beauty is enhanced with the presence of various types of animals and plants. Man, in his misguidance has intensely meddled with nature. He has crushed forests, and in this manner, even changed the environmental conditions and the atmosphere, due to which some species of plants and animals have been totally wiped out, even though they were fundamental to the economy of Nature.



So, having a center of study and research about birds in their habitat will help the researchers working in this field. Specifically, or by implication, it can bring back the lost eco-balance over this zone. With this project, I am implementing bird-friendly architecture, which is not being practiced here in Pakistan. The Ecoplex Ecological Park is an initiative of the Government to preserve the natural environment of the region and to create a national hub to gather various ecological valuables.

AVIARY





The research done here is to design a systematic way through which Tharri people can get maximum output from the main assets that they have and use those assets with a method of Architecture to economically develop the community.

The research process involves the visit to Tharparkar, the local materials, the natural dwellings, the traditions, the culture, the handicrafts,

human ratio, the Hazards, the Solar Geometry of the region and designing a Handicrafts Manufactory through Local Fabrication Method in Architecture using all the above mentioned aspects systematically to make Tharparkar economically developed which would automatically solve the issues of the community such as education, infrastructure and basic needs and stitch back Tharparkar as a progressive region.


(Ambar-e-Pamir) Mountaineering Adventure Hub A guided path toward unfolding mountain mysteries Hunza, Gilgit Baltistan



80% of the oceans are still unknown to us. There are 386+ marine institutes, colleges and universities around the world which are doing research and development in the field of Marine sciences. Pakistan has 1046 km long coastline along the Arabian sea. The Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ) of Pakistan covers an area of about 240,000 sq. km. The maritime zone of Pakistan, including the continental shelf, extends up to 350 nautical miles from the coastline and yet Pakistan has no Marine research institute which provide the opportunity for researchers and scientist to explore the marine life.


My project "The Reef" is about designing a facility

for research and development in the fields related to Marine sciences like Marine biology, Hydrology, Hydrography, Hydrogeology, Oceanography and etc. in Gwadar, Pakistan where researchers from all over the Pakistan and scientists are eager to study different marine habitats around the world can gather under the same roof and share their remarkable experiences and make new ones.



National Marine research institute will be designed on the concept of Bio-Morphism. (Biomorphic architecture is the design of building directly influenced by the animal, vegetal, human body and anatomical structure with chosen materials to create aesthetic harmony and this phenomena of mimicking the organism is called bio-morphism). Due to its influence on research center and other buildings around it, it's called the reef from the Coral reefs under water.It will contain a research center with state-of-the-art marine biology and technological labs, development tanks to study the marine life and submersibles closely in a control environment, library and accommodation for the researchers coming from farfetched areas. There will be an aquarium which serves 2 main purposes, as display of the researches conducted in research center and as well as a recreational facility for the general masses.


This two-day event was held at the Expo Center and was open for the public. International and national speakers were invited, where they presented their research papers and healthy discussion was conducted in five technical sessions.

BAMBOO WORKSHOP


NOVEMBER 19-20, 2018




Another educational trip for the 4th year students was arranged to Kallar Kahar. The purpose was to let the students carry out a site analysis for their project 'University Campus'.

I remember almost two years ago, as wewere in the classroom, our teacher asked us to write our opinion of Lahore; to scrutinize its evolution. And like idiots we had all focused on so much negativity, our ignorant minds simply stumbled upon the mundane and everyday complaints of the average Lohri or Lohriye as they maybe called. This is why I fell in love with this city. For I too, was an outcast. But Lahore embraced me like a band aid. It helped me figure out an identity devoid of past references. It let me be. It urged me to be. How can you not love someone who constantly pushes you towards excellence? Who keeps igniting the flame?

I love Lahore; both of its colors.

"No, but where are you really from?" It is the question that automatically makes the hair on the back of my neck stand up. Like many 'Two Country Children' I panic, wondering whether the question refers to my nationality, where I was born, or where I am living now.

I am a two-country child, I was raised in one country and now am living in another. So, when asked about home, my answer usually is everywhere and no-where.



When I experienced, I realized it fully, everything was empathizing in its fullest meaning. Natural, heartsease and full of emotions.



Give yourself a home away from home.




